



Can I connect an extension cord to the electrical distribution box on a construction site

Article Overview

Extension cords can be used with a construction site's electrical distribution box only as a temporary solution, following strict OSHA and NEC safety requirements.

Temporary Use Only

Extension cords are considered temporary wiring under OSHA and NEC standards and should not replace permanent wiring. They are intended for short-term use to power tools, lighting, or equipment when permanent outlets are unavailable . OSHA emphasizes that temporary wiring should be removed promptly once work is completed .

Cord Ratings and Grounding

Any extension cord connected to a distribution box must be rated for hard or extra-hard usage (NEC codes S, ST, SO, STO for hard service; SJ, SJO, SJTO for junior hard service) and three-wire type to maintain proper grounding . Ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) are required if cords are used in damp or wet conditions .

Inspection and Safety

Before use, extension cords must be visually inspected for damage, such as frayed insulation, exposed wires, or deformed plugs . Damaged cords must be removed from service immediately. Cords should be routed to avoid pinch points, doorways, or areas where they could be crushed, and they must be protected from physical damage .

Connection Guidelines

- o Ensure plugs and receptacles are compatible and properly grounded .
- o Do not alter plugs or use adapters that interrupt grounding continuity .
- o Employees should avoid handling energized plugs with wet hands and use insulating equipment if necessary .
- o Locking-type connectors should be properly secured after connection .

Compliance Considerations

- o Temporary wiring should not exceed 90 days unless specifically authorized .
- o All components must be OSHA-approved and industrial-grade, suitable for outdoor and high-traffic



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environments .

o Only qualified personnel should install or inspect connections to ensure compliance with OSHA 29 CFR 1926.405 and NEC Article 400 and 590 .
