Using Your Own Router with Fiber

- o Advanced Features: Using your own router can provide better Wi-Fi coverage, advanced security (WPA3), Quality of Service (QoS), VPN support, and more control over your network .

Implementation Options

- o Full Replacement: Disconnect the ISP router and connect your router directly to the ONT. This may require obtaining ISP credentials or configuring VLAN settings for full service functionality .
- o Bridge or Cascade Mode: Keep the ISP router active but set it to bridge mode, allowing your personal router to manage Wi-Fi and LAN while the ISP device handles the ONT connection. This is often simpler and avoids service interruptions .
