

Cold aisle width in computer room

Article Overview

The standard cold aisle width in a computer room is typically 1.2 meters (approximately 4 feet), with wider aisles of 1.8 meters used for contained cold aisles.

Standard Cold Aisle Width

For conventional open cold aisles, the recommended width is 1.2 meters, which usually corresponds to the space of two raised floor tiles . This width allows sufficient airflow to the front of server racks, ensures personnel can access equipment safely, and maintains proper thermal performance . In some cases, if ceiling heights exceed 3.7 meters or additional overhead access is required, slightly wider aisles may be necessary .

Contained Cold Aisles

In cold aisle containment systems, the aisle is enclosed to trap cold air and prevent mixing with hot exhaust air. The standard width for a contained cold aisle is typically 1.2 meters (two floor tiles) or 1.8 meters (three floor tiles) . Containment improves cooling efficiency, reduces energy consumption, and ensures consistent inlet temperatures for servers . Glass sliding doors or modular panels are often used at aisle ends to maintain the enclosed environment.

Design Considerations

- o Airflow Efficiency: Proper aisle width ensures that cold air from perforated floor tiles reaches server intakes effectively .
- o Equipment Access: Aisle width must allow technicians to safely service racks without obstructing airflow .
- o Heat Load: For racks with higher heat dissipation, contained cold aisles may be preferred to optimize cooling and reduce the required air volume .
- o Compliance: Following ANSI/TIA/EIA-942-A standards ensures that the data center meets recognized best practices for airflow and safety . In summary, 1.2 meters is the standard width for open cold aisles, while 1.8 meters may be used for contained cold aisles to maximize cooling efficiency and operational flexibility in modern data centers .

Cold aisle containment is preferred for facilities with the raised floor as a supply air plenum, as well as for retrofit
