- o Used or tangled cables generally have little resale value and are better suited for recycling .
- o Avoid selling cables through informal channels like eBay unless you are a recognized seller, as buyers may be wary of quality and authenticity .

Recycling

Fiber optic cables are mixed-material products (glass fibers, polymers, and reinforcement), so they require specialized recycling processes . Electronics recycling companies can handle fiber cables along with other telecom equipment, providing controlled routing, documentation, and proper disposal. Spools and packaging can often be returned or recycled separately to reduce clutter and environmental impact .
