



Honduras power distribution box configuration requirements

Article Overview

Power distribution boxes in Honduras must comply with 120 V, 60 Hz standards, use Type A or B outlets, and incorporate proper grounding, circuit protection, and agency-approved components.

Voltage and Frequency

Honduras operates on a standard voltage of 120 V and a frequency of 60 Hz. All distribution boxes, outlets, and connected devices must be rated for these specifications to ensure safe operation and prevent equipment damage .

Plug and Outlet Types

- o Type A (NEMA 1-15): Two flat parallel prongs, ungrounded, rated at 15 A. Blades are polarized with different widths to ensure correct insertion .
- o Type B (NEMA 5-15): Two flat parallel prongs plus a grounding pin, rated at 15 A. The grounding pin is longer to connect before the power is applied . Outlets are not recessed, so partially inserted plugs can expose live pins, requiring careful installation and safety measures .

Circuit Protection

Distribution boxes should include:

- o Miniature Circuit Breakers (MCBs) for overcurrent protection.
- o Residual Current Devices (RCDs/GFCIs) for protection against ground faults, especially in wet or outdoor areas .
- o Surge protection devices are recommended to safeguard sensitive electronics.

Power Distribution Units (PDUs)

For commercial or data center applications:

- o PDUs and power strips must be Honduras-approved and comply with local standards.
- o Options include surface mount, rack mount, and general-purpose PDUs.
- o Multiple outlet configurations are available for industrial or server room setups .

Wiring and Installation



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- o Use agency-approved power cords and AC cables compliant with RoHS and REACH standards.
- o Ensure proper grounding for all Type B outlets.
- o Maintain clear labeling of circuits and load capacities.
- o Custom-length and shielded cords are available for specialized installations .

Safety Considerations

- o Avoid partially inserted plugs to prevent accidental contact with live pins.
- o Ensure all components are rated for 15 A maximum per outlet.
- o Use weatherproof outlets for outdoor installations.
- o Follow manufacturer guidelines for PDUs, power strips, and distribution boxes to maintain compliance and safety . By adhering to these requirements, power distribution boxes in Honduras can safely support residential, commercial, and industrial electrical systems while ensuring compatibility with local plug types and voltage standards.
