

How much spacing should the cables be fixed in the cable tray

Article Overview

Cables in a tray should be spaced to allow heat dissipation, prevent interference, and comply with NEC standards, typically 150mm vertically and 300mm horizontally between power and signal trays.

General Spacing Guidelines

- o Vertical spacing between trays: Minimum 150 millimeters (6 inches) is recommended to prevent obstruction, allow ventilation, and maintain structural integrity .
- o Horizontal spacing between parallel trays: At least 0.6 meters (24 inches) when trays are at the same height to ensure maintenance access and proper airflow .
- o Power vs. signal cable separation: Maintain a minimum of 0.5 meters (20 inches) horizontally to reduce electromagnetic interference (EMI). If trays are shielded, spacing can be reduced to 0.3 meters (12 inches), .

Cable Arrangement Within a Tray

- o Large conductors (No. 4/0 AWG or larger) should not be stacked to avoid mechanical damage and insulation breakdown .
- o Smaller conductors can be layered within the tray, optimizing space while maintaining proper airflow and heat dissipation .
- o Fill limits: Power cables should not exceed 40% of the tray cross-sectional area, and control cables should not exceed 50% .

Additional Considerations

- o Supports: Standard trays require supports every 6-10 feet, while heavy-duty trays can span up to 20 feet between supports .
- o Ties and fasteners: Use fire-rated cable ties to maintain spacing and prevent cables from shifting, especially in plenum spaces .
- o Future expansion: Adequate spacing allows for additional cables and easier maintenance without compromising safety . By following these spacing guidelines, you ensure safe operation, reduced EMI, proper heat dissipation, and compliance with NEC Article 392 standards.
