

# How to adjust the diameter of optical fiber cable

You cannot physically change the core diameter of an optical fiber, but you can manage the effective bend diameter during installation to prevent damage and maintain performance.

## Understanding Fiber Diameter vs. Bend Radius

The diameter of a fiber optic cable refers to the full width of the cable, including core, cladding, coating, and jacket layers, while the bend radius is the minimum radius the cable can be bent without causing signal loss or physical damage. The bend radius is critical because bending the cable too tightly can lead to microbending or macrobending, increasing attenuation and potentially causing permanent fiber damage.

## Managing Effective Diameter During Installation

- o Follow Manufacturer Specifications: Each cable has a specified minimum bend radius. Typically, the minimum bend radius under tension during pulling is 20 times the cable diameter, and after installation (static), it is 10 times the cable diameter. For example, an 8 mm cable requires a minimum bend radius of 160 mm during installation and 80 mm after installation.
- o Use Proper Tools: When pulling fiber over pulleys, capstans, or through ducts, ensure the pulley or capstan diameter is at least twice the bend radius to avoid exceeding the cable's stress limits. This effectively manages the "diameter" of the bend without altering the cable itself.
- o Cable Lubrication and Handling: Use cable lubricant to reduce friction when pulling through ducts, and avoid pinching or kinking the cable against edges or corners. Swivels can prevent cable twist, which helps maintain the proper bend diameter.
- o Dynamic vs. Static Conditions: During pulling or movement, the cable is under tension, so maintain a larger bend radius. Once installed, the cable can safely occupy tighter loops, but still within the static bend radius limits.
- o Use Bend-Insensitive Fiber: In tight spaces, bend-insensitive fiber allows sharper bends without signal loss, but minimum bend radius guidelines must still be followed.

- o Always check the cable data sheet for specific bend radius and tensile limits.
- o Avoid forcing the cable into bends smaller than recommended, as this can cause tube deformation, fiber breakage, or increased attenuation.
- o When storing or coiling fiber, ensure loops meet the minimum diameter requirements to prevent long-term stress. By carefully managing the bend radius and using proper installation techniques, you effectively control the "working diameter" of the fiber cable, ensuring reliable performance and extending its service life.
