

How to convert a fiber optic cable into a router cable

You cannot plug a fiber optic cable directly into a standard router; you need an ONT or media converter to convert the optical signal into an Ethernet signal for your router.

Using an Optical Network Terminal (ONT)

- o Obtain an ONT: Most ISPs provide an Optical Network Terminal, which converts the incoming fiber optic light signal into an electrical Ethernet signal .
- o Connect the fiber cable: Plug the fiber optic cable from your ISP into the ONT's designated optical port. Handle the connectors carefully to avoid dirt or damage .
- o Link to your router: Use a high-quality Ethernet cable (Cat6 or Cat6a recommended) to connect the ONT's Ethernet/LAN port to your router's WAN or Internet port .
- o Power on devices: First, power on the ONT and wait for the status lights to stabilize, then power on your router .
- o Configure your router: Access the router's admin panel via a web browser and enter any ISP credentials if required. Update firmware for optimal performance .

Using a Media Converter

- o Get a media converter: This device converts optical signals to electrical signals and vice versa .
- o Connect fiber to the converter: Insert the fiber optic cable into the appropriate port on the media converter, ensuring the connector type matches (e.g., LC or SC).
- o Connect Ethernet to router: Use a standard Ethernet cable to connect the RJ45 port on the media converter to your router's WAN port .
- o Power the converter: Plug in the media converter and verify that the link lights indicate a successful connection.

Optional: SFP/SFP+ Transceiver Modules

Some routers and switches have SFP or SFP+ ports. You can insert a compatible transceiver module that converts the fiber signal to an electrical signal directly for the device. Then, plug the fiber cable into the transceiver .

Key Tips

- o Always handle fiber connectors by the plastic housing to avoid contamination or damage .
- o Place the ONT or media converter near a power source and in a dry, ventilated area .
- o Use high-quality Ethernet cables to preserve the speed and reliability of your fiber connection .
- o Verify connectivity by checking the status lights on both the ONT/media converter and the router. By
