

How to number the cables in a distribution box

- o For manual cables, numbering follows the graphical sequence in the schematic. Cables leading to a common target should be numbered consecutively .
- o Parallel power cables or multiple single-core cables are scheduled as one cable number, with individual cores or runs suffixed appropriately (e.g., /L1-1, /L2-1, /L3-1), .

- o Use durable, legible labels that can withstand environmental conditions such as heat, moisture, or chemicals .
- o Place labels near the ends of the cable and at junction points for easy identification.
- o Ensure labels include the distribution board reference, circuit number, and cable suffix to maintain traceability .
