

Must lighting distribution boxes be grounded on-site

Importance of Grounding

Grounding provides a low-resistance path for fault currents, preventing metal parts of the distribution box or connected fixtures from becoming energized and posing a shock hazard. In the event of a fault, the current flows directly to the ground, allowing protective devices like circuit breakers to trip immediately, minimizing the risk of electrical shock or fire (Engineer Fix) .

Grounding Requirements for Distribution Boxes

- o Metal Boxes: According to the National Electrical Code (NEC), any metal distribution box must be grounded. This is typically done by connecting the equipment grounding conductor (EGC) to a grounding screw or metal mounting strap inside the box, ensuring electrical bonding between the box and the system ground (Engineer Fix) .
- o Non-Metallic Boxes: Plastic or non-conductive boxes do not require grounding themselves, but the ground wire running through the box must still be connected to the fixture's ground terminal to maintain a continuous grounding path (Engineer Fix) .
- o Distribution Box Standards: Each distribution box and controller must be grounded, with specific wire sizes depending on the market (e.g., 10 AWG in the US). Ground resistance between system parts should be less than 0.1 Ohm to ensure effective grounding (Atlas Copco) .

Best Practices

- o Bond all metal enclosures, raceways, and equipment grounding conductors into a continuous system to maintain equal potential and reduce voltage differences (Electrical Engineering Portal) .
- o Test grounding resistance regularly; a maximum of 25 Ohms is recommended for reliable protection (Coloria Group) .
- o Use high-quality materials for grounding rods and conductors to prevent corrosion and maintain long-term safety (Coloria Group) .
