

No power at the bottom of the distribution box

Safety First

- o Component Degradation: Aging or damaged components, corrosion, or environmental factors like moisture can interrupt power delivery .
- o Overloading: Excessive load on the circuit can cause overheating and high resistance, leading to power loss at certain points .

Troubleshooting Steps

- o Check the Main Power Supply: Measure voltage at the input to the distribution box to ensure adequate power is supplied .
- o Inspect Breakers and Fuses: Reset tripped breakers or replace blown fuses. Confirm that breakers are functioning properly .
- o Examine Wiring and Connections: Look for loose, corroded, or improperly installed wires. Ensure all terminals are properly tightened and wires are correctly positioned .
- o Measure Voltage at the Bottom: Use a voltmeter to check voltage at the unpowered section. If there is a significant drop, consider shortening the cable, increasing wire gauge, or checking for damaged cables .
- o Test Components Individually: If possible, test devices connected to the bottom of the box with an alternative power source to rule out faulty loads .

- o Repair or Replace Faulty Components: Replace damaged wires, terminals, breakers, or fuses as needed .
- o Regular Maintenance: Inspect the distribution box periodically, clean terminals, and replace aging parts to



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prevent future failures .
