

What to do if the telecommunications bureau refuses to lay fiber optic cables

If the fiber optic work is indeed unauthorized and causing harm to your property, you may have several potential legal remedies. These could include: Injunction: A court order that stops the company from continuing the work. That value may be financial (such as a lease payment in return for access to a city's fiber network) or it may be less tangible (such as a commitment by the partner to deliver broadband service to low-income residents in return for access to a city's excess conduit). However, the specifics can vary depending on local laws and regulations, easements, and the terms of any agreements you may have with.
