

Why cut fiber optic cables

Copper thieves sometimes mistakenly target fiber-optic cables, and intentional sabotage has been reported, with operators describing certain incidents as "felony vandalism" or even likening them to domestic terrorism due to the scale of disruption . In conflict zones or politically sensitive areas, undersea cables have also been targeted, potentially as part of strategic campaigns, though many incidents remain unconfirmed .

Consequences

When a fiber optic cable is cut, the light signals carrying data, voice, and video are immediately blocked, causing widespread outages or degraded service . Repairing a cut is time-consuming because each individual fiber strand must be re-spliced, which can take hours or longer depending on terrain and the extent of the damage . In summary, fiber optic cables are cut due to a mix of accidental human activity, environmental stress, animal interference, and intentional acts, all of which can severely disrupt communications infrastructure and require careful repair and preventive measures .
